AI Kairos Free AI Literacy Starter Pack

## What this pack is for

This starter pack gives teachers, families, schools, and adult learners a clean set of AI literacy resources. It is built for practical conversations: what AI is, when to use it, how to check it, and how to stay responsible.

Use the color-accent files for digital sharing or polished handouts. Use the black-and-white files for photocopying, low-ink printing, or classroom packets.

## How to use the pack

| Step | Action                   | Why it helps   |
|------|--------------------------|--|
| 1    | Start with READY         | Print or share the READY Framework Reference first. It gives learners and adults a common language.                      |
| 2    | Choose the audience      | Use the adult lesson plans for parents, caregivers, staff, and community groups. Use the assessment for school settings. |
| 3    | Print only what you need | Use the color-accent version for digital sharing and the black-and-white version for photocopying.                       |
| 4    | Keep AI human-led        | Remind learners that AI is a tool. The person using it is responsible for the final decision.                            |

## Suggested quick-start path

| Time                   | Use this activity   |
|------------------------|---|
| First 10 minutes       | Read the READY Framework Reference together. Ask: Where do we already see AI?   |
| Next 15 minutes        | Pick one realistic AI output and evaluate it using READY.                       |
| Next lesson or meeting | Use the glossary and policy template to build shared language and expectations. |

# READY Framework

Use this wording across AI Kairos documents.

| Letter   | AI Kairos wording                   | Plain-language teaching note  |
|----------|-------------------------------------|---|
| <b>R</b> | Recognize AI all around you         | Notice where AI appears in tools, apps, search, recommendations, images, and everyday tasks.    |
| <b>E</b> | Evaluate outputs                    | Ask yourself: "Do I need to use AI for this?" Check accuracy, usefulness, privacy, and purpose. |
| <b>A</b> | Apply skills you have learned       | Use AI thoughtfully. Apply prompt-writing, checking, revision, and responsible-use habits.      |
| <b>D</b> | Develop more skills                 | Keep practicing. Reflect on what worked, what did not, and what skill you want to build next.   |
| <b>Y</b> | You are in charge of how you use AI | The human makes the choice. You decide when to use AI, how to use it, and what to trust.        |

## Printing notes

- Use color-accent PDFs when you want a polished digital download or a clean resource for email and LMS sharing.
- Use black-and-white PDFs for classroom packets, photocopying, and low-ink printing.
- Print at actual size or fit to page. For two-sided packets, use long-edge binding.
